Our Father

The Lord's Prayer begins with the line, "Our Father in heaven, hallowed be your name." For many this prayer is simply referred to as "Our Father." We are using this prayer that Jesus taught us as a prayer to recite with full meaning and purpose in doing so. We can also use this prayer as an outline for prayer. We find six distinct demarcations in this prayer. We begin our time of prayer with praise and worship of our heavenly Father. Followed by prayers of dedication and consecration, supplication, confession, direction and protection, and closing in worship.

Today we look at the first line: "Our Father in heaven, hallowed be your name."

Matthew 6:9-13

Our Father in heaven, hallowed be your name. Your kingdom come. Your will be done on earth as it is in heaven. Give us this day our daily bread. Forgive us our debts, as we forgive our debtors. Lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from evil.

For yours is the kingdom and the power and the glory forever. Amen.

Our Father

- How we pray to God is largely affected by the way that we view our relationship to him.
- "Our Father" expresses special relationship status.
- To call God "Our Father" implies the experience Jesus enjoys has been transmitted to us.
 - For as many as are led by the Spirit of God, these are sons of God. 15 For you did not receive the spirit of bondage again to fear, but you received the Spirit of adoption by whom we cry out, "Abba, Father." 16 The Spirit Himself bears witness with our spirit that we are children of God, 17 and if children, then heirs--heirs of God and joint heirs with Christ, if indeed we suffer with [Him], that we may also be glorified together. Romans 8:14-17
 - And because you are sons, God has sent forth the Spirit of His Son into your hearts, crying out, "Abba, Father!" 7 Therefore you are no longer a slave but a son, and if a son, then an heir of God through Christ. Galatians 4:6-7
 - * "Abba" emphasizes the most intimate way of relating to God.
- "When we come to recognize God as "Abba" we begin to speak to someone we believe is not only there, but is listening with loving and rapt attention." Teresa of Avila

Hallowed be your name

- Hallowed: Give honor as holy
 - In the year that King Uzziah died, I saw the Lord sitting on a throne, high and lifted up, and the train of His [robe] filled the temple. 2 Above it stood seraphim; each one had six wings: with two he covered his face, with two he covered his feet, and with two he flew. 3 And one cried to another and said: "Holy, holy, holy [is] the LORD of hosts; The whole earth [is] full of His glory!" -Isaiah 6:1-3
 - [The] four living creatures, each having six wings, were full of eyes around and within. And they do not rest day or night, saying: "Holy, holy, holy, Lord God Almighty, Who was and is and is to come!" Revelation 4:8
- Names of God
 - El Shaddai—God Almighty

- El Elyon-God Most High
- I Am Who I Am—God was, is, and always will be
- Yahweh (Jehovah): Self-Existent One
- Compound names of God
 - When Abraham prepared to sacrifice Isaac, God provided a ram for the offering just before Abraham slayed his son. Abraham declared God to be Yahweh Yireh: The Lord Who Provides (sees before)—Genesis 22:14
 - After the children of Israel were delivered from slavery in Egypt, God made this statement, Yahweh Rapha: I am The Lord Who Heals you—Exodus 15:26
 - God empowered Israel's army to defeat the Amalekites. After Moses built an altar and named it Yahweh Nissi: The Lord is my Banner (Victory)—Exodus 17:15
 - When God called Gideon to deliver Israel, he built an altar in that place and named it Yahweh Shalom: The Lord is my Peace—Judges 6:24
 - Reflecting upon God's faithfulness, David wrote Psalm 23, Yahweh Rohi: The Lord is my Shepherd
 - Ezekiel gave a detailed description of the New Jerusalem and prophesied that the place will be called Yahweh Shammah: The Lord is There—Ezekiel 48:35

Holy Communion

Lord Holy Spirit, you are the giver of life in whom we live and move and have our being; consecrate this bread and wine to be, for us, the Body and Blood of our Lord Jesus Christ and consecrate us, O Lord, to partake of this holy meal. (Additional wording can go here.) All this we ask, Lord Holy Spirit, in the name of Jesus Christ, who lives and reigns with you, in the glory of His Father, Amen. Therefore we pray the prayer our Lord taught us, saying:

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Our Father in heaven, hallowed be your name. Your kingdom come, your will be done, on earth as it is in heaven. Give us this day our daily bread. Forgive us our debts as we forgive our debtors. And lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from evil. For yours is the kingdom and the power, and the glory, for ever and ever. Amen.
